# From the Manse

As I write its nearly May Bank holiday weekend the roads are already busy with campervans, and the cruise liners have returned, and out in the fields the cattle are enjoying the fresh grass and wee lambs running full pelt. It seems idyllic and peaceful to the visitors, of course very long hours for the farming community.

Different scenery and people but ordinary folk just the same going about their lives, local folk and tourists in Sri Lanka, when on Easter Sunday suicide bombers ended lives and changed lives for ever.

Hotels and Christian churches were the target of the extremists. There were British folk caught up in the violence but so many more Sri Lankans... every life ended, every wound seen and unseen, the terrible price of terror.

Worshippers in St Andrew's Scots Kirk in Colombo became aware of the severity of the attacks that morning as calls & texts came in. Worshippers 'were given the chance to leave but instead decided to stay and pray for those affected by the terror.'

St Matthew 5:43-47<sub>part</sub> The Message

"You're familiar with the old written law, 'Love your friend,' and its unwritten companion, 'Hate your enemy.' I'm challenging that. I'm telling you to love your enemies. Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst. When someone gives you a hard time, respond with the energies of prayer, for then you are working out of your true selves, your God-created selves...

This is what Christ asks of us... to respond in prayer loving our friends and more still by loving our enemies find our true selves.

The Rt. Rev. Susan Brown Moderator of the General Assembly has asked we mark the first weekend of May with white ribbons in our churches, a sign of solidarity with the people of Sri Lanka, and with our brothers and sisters of faith.

During this year already and late last year there have been attacks by extremists on people of faith as they gathered to pray. Recently in Glasgow representatives of different worshipping groups met together - from the Kirk, from the Glasgow Central Mosque, from the Catholic and Episcopal churches, the Bahá'í Council of Scotland, the Buddhist and Jewish communities – meeting together in support of each other.

Two very important comments reported from that conference:

"Each community have been struck for different reasons and by different groups but the reasons are united by hate and we can only defeat this with solidarity and appreciation of each other because of, not in spite of, our differences."

"The most important thing we can do to face these atrocities is turn towards each other to take a stand rather than turn in on ourselves."

On the first Sunday of May we will have white ribbons in our church to show we stand together with people of peace and faith and join each in our own way in praying for peace, justice and freedom from terror... and those prayers will continue...
